To His Excellency Assimi Goïta

Your Excellency,

I am writing to you as a citizen who wakes up every morning in a land defined by resilience and shadowed by uncertainty. As we navigate June 2026, the pulse of Mali is thumping with the rhythm of survival. We are a nation at a crossroads, where the grand history of our ancestors meets the harsh, dust-blown reality of today.

If you walk our streets, you see a harsh divide: the dusty roads are

filled with aging, battered Japanese-made sedans and overloaded motorcycles that serve as the lifeline of our transit, weaving precariously between the heavy, armored vehicles of security forces.

For many of us, there is no "leisure" as the world understands it. We lack grand cinemas or state-sponsored theaters; instead, our culture finds its home in our music, in the small, intimate gatherings under the shade of a tree, or the radio signals that bridge the vast distances of our country. We worry, Mr. President. We worry about the security situation that keeps our northern and central regions in constant flux, and we fear the growing isolation of our urban centers from the rest of the world. We need a path that doesn't just prioritize military survival but fosters human growth—jobs for our graduates, food on the tables of our farmers, and a future where our children can dream of something other than the next patrol.

We place our hope in you to lead us toward stability, not just on the battlefield, but in the halls of justice and the stalls of our markets. We need a government that acts as a true architect of peace, one that listens to the quiet desperation of the people and builds a future where dignity is not a luxury, but our birthright.
