

Letter to the President of Namibia

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To Her Excellency Netumbo Nandi-Ndaitwah

President of the Republic of Namibia

State House, Windhoek

Your Excellency,

I am writing to you as a citizen watching the sun climb over the vast, arid beauty of our land in June 2026. Living in Namibia is a unique experience—we are a nation defined by space, sunlight, and a resilience forged in the desert. Yet, even in our endless summer, the pressure of daily survival weighs heavily on the hearts of your people.

Life here is a study in contrasts. People often romanticize our climate—no snow to shovel, no heavy coats or fur-lined boots to buy—which, in theory, should be a boon to the family budget. But the reality is that the money saved on winter gear is quickly swallowed by the soaring cost of basic nutrition and the electricity bills that keep our cooling systems humming. Speaking of energy, while we enjoy the sun, we still

struggle with the basics. We don't have the luxury of cheap, piped gas throughout our homes; while many in the cities use gas cylinders to heat their meals, out in the peripheral settlements, the rhythmic sound of a cooking fire in the yard is still the heartbeat of the home.

Our educational landscape is changing, yet our institutes feel like they are chasing a mirage of "modernity." Graduates emerge with degrees but find themselves standing on corners, wondering where the promised jobs have gone. We see the streets of Windhoek filled with rugged 4x4s—essential for our harsh terrain—but for the average worker, the daily commute is a long, dusty wait for an informal minibus. We lack the grand cultural monuments and bustling theater districts of Europe; our theaters are the lively community halls and the open desert air, where storytelling is our oldest and most vibrant form of entertainment.

We need a government that sees us, not as statistics on a chart, but as people living in a sun-drenched country that is waiting for its potential to finally bloom. We don't just need solar farms for foreign investors; we need light and warmth in our own homes. We need you and Prime Minister Ngurare to bridge the gap between the gleaming glass buildings of the capital and the real, everyday struggles of those who face the heat without the shelter of corporate wealth.
