Mr. Prime Minister,

Many countries spend enormous resources trying to rebuild social cohesion after losing it.

Tonga still possesses much of it naturally.

And that is a treasure that does not appear in economic reports.

Mr. Prime Minister,

Life in Tonga is peaceful compared with many parts of the world.

Children attend schools.

Students pursue higher education.

Families gather after church services.

Fishermen head out before sunrise.

Markets sell local produce.

Small businesses support communities.

People know their neighbors.

Many know several generations of the same family.

There are hospitals and healthcare services.

There are supermarkets, restaurants, hotels and growing tourism.

There is internet access and increasing connection to the wider world.

Yet there are also realities that concern many citizens.

The cost of living.

Limited employment opportunities.

Dependence on imports.

Economic vulnerability.

And perhaps most importantly, the continuing departure of young people seeking better opportunities abroad.

For many talented Tongans, countries such as New Zealand and Australia offer larger economies and broader career possibilities.

The result is a dilemma faced by many small island nations.

How do you keep your best talent at home when the world is offering attractive alternatives?

Mr. Prime Minister,

The future of Tonga will depend not only on preserving traditions but on creating opportunities.

A young person should not have to choose between success and homeland.

They should be able to have both.

This means strengthening education.

Supporting entrepreneurship.

Encouraging innovation.

Expanding digital opportunities.

Building industries that can thrive despite geographic isolation.

Because geography is both Tonga's blessing and its challenge.

The ocean connects Tonga to the world.

But it also separates Tonga from many economic opportunities available elsewhere.

Mr. Prime Minister,

No discussion about Tonga's future can ignore the power of nature.

The people of Tonga understand better than most nations that life can change overnight.

Cyclones.

Volcanic activity.

Earthquakes.

Tsunamis.

The spectacular eruption of the underwater volcano in 2022 reminded the entire

world how vulnerable island nations can be.

Yet it also revealed something else.

Resilience.

The ability of communities to support one another during difficult times.

The determination to rebuild.

The refusal to surrender to circumstances.

These qualities deserve recognition.

Because national strength is not measured by the absence of challenges.

It is measured by how people respond to them.

Mr. Prime Minister,

When I observe Tonga, I do not see a small island kingdom.

To remain itself while adapting to a rapidly changing world.

To protect its culture without isolating itself.

To embrace progress without losing identity.
