To His Excellency João Lourenço President of the Republic of Angola Cidade Alta, Luanda

Your Excellency,

To analyze the state of Angola in June 2026 is to observe a nation that remains a riddle of extreme contrasts. Luanda, the capital, is a sensory paradox: the air is heavy with the salt spray of the Atlantic and the sharp, dusty heat of the interior, constantly interrupted by the smell of expensive, high-octane fuel burning in the city's endless parade of luxury SUVs, while just blocks away, the scent of funge (cassava porridge) cooking over charcoal fires defines the daily reality of the majority. The city is a forest of gleaming, unfinished skyscrapers and luxury glass towers—monuments to oil wealth—standing in the shadows of vast, informal settlements where life moves at a different, far more desperate pace.

Your mandate for the remainder of 2026 is to determine whether Angola will remain a country owned by the few, or become a nation built for the many:

The Oil Curse and the Diversification Myth: Angola remains structurally tethered to the price of a barrel of oil. While your efforts to reform the state-owned oil giant, Sonangol, have brought more transparency, the "diversification" of your economy remains largely a slogan. The agricultural potential of the interior is immense, yet the infrastructure to move crops to ports is crumbling. Without a robust road and rail network, Angola is a country that can export oil but cannot feed its own people.

The Crisis of the "Informal Soul": The vast majority of your population works in the informal sector, selling everything from plastic trinkets to fruit on the roadside in the relentless heat. These people are the true engine of the country, yet the formal state treats them as an inconvenience rather than a foundation. The cost of living, exacerbated by the volatility of the Kwanza, has pushed basic nutrition out of reach for many. There is a deep, simmering frustration in the markets of Luanda—a feeling that the "Angolan growth" reported in GDP figures never makes it to the family dinner table.

Governance and Corruption: While you have campaigned on "cleaning house," the perception remains that corruption is not just a problem in Angola—it is the operating system. The judiciary is still viewed by many as an extension of the party, and the business environment is heavily guarded by gatekeepers. If you want foreign investors to build factories rather than just extract resources, you must create a legal framework that treats the law as something that applies to the powerful, not just the powerless.

Healthcare and Education: You have made progress in rebuilding clinics, but the healthcare system is a tale of two worlds. The elite fly to Portugal or Dubai for surgery, while the average Angolan struggles to find basic antibiotics in the rural provincias. The education system is failing to produce the skilled workforce needed for a modern economy; you are churning out graduates for a job market that simply does not exist because the country lacks the industrial base to absorb them.

Mr. President, Angola is a land of breathtaking natural beauty and immense mineral wealth. But wealth is not development. If the next few years are spent merely managing the volatility of oil prices, the "Angolan opportunity" will pass, leaving behind a nation of concrete shells and disappointed youth. It is time for the wealth of

the soil to empower the people of the soil.
