

Open Letter to President Denis Sassou Nguesso

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To His Excellency Denis Sassou Nguesso

President of the Republic of the Congo

Palace of the People, Brazzaville

Your Excellency,

To analyze the state of the Republic of the Congo in June 2026 is to observe a nation trapped in a cycle of "paradox of plenty." As you begin your latest term, the atmosphere in Brazzaville and across the country is defined by a deep-seated disconnect: while the state apparatus functions with rigid central control, the vast majority of the population remains excluded from the prosperity that the nation's vast oil and mineral wealth should theoretically provide. The streets reflect a quiet, simmering frustration—a country where nearly half the population is under 18, and where the hope for the future is increasingly stifled by a lack of economic mobility.

Your mandate at this stage of your long tenure is to address the fundamental structural rot that threatens the long-term stability of the Republic:

The Economic Stagnation of the Majority: While oil revenues continue to pour into the state coffers, the "trickle-down" effect remains a myth for the average citizen. Real per capita income has declined significantly since 2015. Your citizens are not asking for more of the same; they are looking for a break from the stagnation. They need to see a shift from oil-dependency toward the diversification of the economy, specifically in agriculture and mining, to provide the 40%+ of unemployed youth with a sense of purpose and a path to a livelihood.

The Crisis of Governance and Corruption: The international community and your own people see the Republic of the Congo's ranking on corruption indices as a barrier to real development. The systemic patronage that characterizes the current political economy is not merely a bureaucratic inefficiency—it is a tax on the poor. When public resources are diverted, the result is felt in the unreliability of electricity, the degradation of water services, and the delays in basic public sector salaries.

The Succession Question and Political Space: The current electoral environment, characterized by a lack of authorized protests and the sidelining of opposition figures, has created a pressure cooker. The intraparty succession battle within your own circles is intensifying, and the public is watching closely. Stability will not be maintained through the restriction of civic space or the silencing of dissent, but through a clear, institutionalized vision for the future of the party and the nation that includes all Congolese.

The Human Development Gap: Your administration has presided over improvements in debt management, but these gains have not translated into improvements in health or education. The people are weary of seeing their country's wealth tied up in international debt or lost to mismanagement while their own basic needs—schools, clinics, and clean water—remain unmet.

Mr. President, the Congolese people have shown immense patience. But patience has a limit. They hope that this period of your leadership will be marked not by the continuation of the status quo, but by a courageous pivot toward institutional transparency, the inclusion of the younger generation, and an economic model that

treats the nation's natural resources as a trust for the people, not a reserve for the elite.
