

Open Letter to President Brice Oligui Nguema

Your Excellency,

To analyze the state of Gabon in June 2026—nearly two years into your transition—is to observe a nation that has traded the quiet, suffocating rot of the Bongo dynasty for the high-stakes, volatile energy of military-led reform. Libreville is currently a city of restless anticipation. The air is heavy with the familiar, thick humidity of the Atlantic coast, but it is now overlaid with the scent of urgent, aggressive construction. The streets are cleaner than they have been in decades, and the nouveau-riche silence of the old regime has been replaced by the loud, ambitious hum of new machinery and the constant presence of military patrols that ensure the "New Gabon" order is respected.

Your mandate for the remainder of 2026 is to prove that this transition is a genuine "restoration of institutions," rather than just a re-labeling of the old power structure:

The Illusion of the "New Deal": The streets are buzzing with the energy of public works—paved roads, repaired lighting, and the visible dismantling of corrupt nodes. This has bought you immense initial goodwill. But the average Gabonese in the quartiers populaires (like PK5 or Rio) is beginning to ask a harder question: "When does the wealth reach me?" While you have successfully repatriated some assets and tightened the fiscal belt, the cost of living remains a crushing burden. Imported food is still exorbitant, and the gap between the military-led administration's promises and the reality of the household budget is widening.

The "Dutch Disease" & Diversification: Your economy remains fundamentally addicted to crude oil, manganese, and timber. You are trying to pivot to sustainable tourism and high-tech forestry, but these are long-term projects in a short-term political cycle. The business elite—those who survived the regime change—are currently hedging their bets, moving capital out rather than investing in your "national renewal." If you do not create a climate where private capital feels safe, you will be left with state-driven projects that are as fragile as the transition itself.

The Education & Youth Crisis: The Gabonese education system was a ghost of its former self, hollowed out by decades of neglect. You are repairing buildings, but you are not yet building minds. The youth are the most impatient constituency in Gabon. They view the military transition as their "reclamation," but if they do not see a tangible path to employment that does not involve patronage or the army, their support will turn into the same disillusionment that fueled the collapse of the last regime.

The International Tightrope: You have managed to avoid the severe isolation that hit neighboring coup-states, largely because you played the "stabilizer" card brilliantly. However, the pressure to set a firm, credible timeline for elections is mounting. The international community is not just watching your infrastructure projects; they are watching your calendar. If the transition drags on, the "liberator" aura will fade, and the "junta" label will stick.

Mr. President, you have dismantled a system that was choking the life out of Gabon. But destruction is easy; construction is the true test. You have the guns, the roads, and the public's temporary trust. Now you need a vision that survives your own

departure.
