To His Excellency Adama Barrow President of the Republic of The Gambia State House, Banjul

Your Excellency,

To analyze the state of The Gambia in June 2026 is to observe a nation trapped in a paradox: it is a country of immense potential that feels as if it is moving through molasses. Banjul is a city of distinct rhythms—the persistent, humid heat rolling off the Gambia River, the constant, low-frequency roar of outboard motors from the fishing boats, and the quiet, persistent struggle of a population waiting for the "New Gambia" to actually materialize. Your mandate for the remainder of 2026 is to address the gap between the democratic freedom you restored and the economic prosperity your people are still chasing:

The Infrastructure of Stagnation: While Banjul has seen some modernization, the country remains choked by its lack of reliable logistics. The reliance on old, crowded ferries to cross the river is a metaphor for the entire state: it is slow, bottlenecked, and prone to breaking down. Without a radical transformation of your transport and energy infrastructure, your ambitions to become a regional trading hub will remain stuck on the drawing board.

The Cost of Living & The Youth Exodus: The Gambia is a nation of young people, yet their energy is currently being exported. Walk through the neighborhoods of Serekunda, and you will see the demographic drain in action; the most ambitious and energetic youth are constantly looking for the "backway"—the perilous migration routes to Europe—because they see no viable path to a middle-class life at home. Inflation has made basic commodities like rice and flour luxuries for many, and the lack of decent wages in the private sector makes the siren call of migration louder than any government campaign.

The Shadow of the Past: Your administration was born from the need to move past the Jammeh era, yet in 2026, the institutions of justice and governance still feel fragile. The TRRC (Truth, Reconciliation and Reparations Commission) was a monumental achievement, but the public is starting to ask: Where is the accountability? When justice is perceived to be delayed or compromised by political expediency, the social fabric begins to fray. You must prove that the rule of law is not just a concept for international donors, but a reality for the average Gambian.

Governance & The Bureaucratic Maze: The administrative system is bloated and slow. Starting a business in The Gambia is an exercise in enduring bureaucratic friction. If you want to move from an aid-dependent economy to one driven by private enterprise, you must dismantle the gatekeeping culture that forces entrepreneurs to spend more time seeking permits than generating value.

Mr. President, The Gambia is small, but its spirit is vast. However, spirit alone does not build roads, lower the price of rice, or keep your youth at home. You have given your people the gift of speech; now you must give them the tools to build.
