

Open Letter to President-elect John Dramani Mahama

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To His Excellency John Dramani Mahama President-elect of the Republic of Ghana
Jubilee House, Accra

Your Excellency,

To analyze the state of Ghana in June 2026—as you settle back into the presidency—is to observe a nation that has placed its trust in your promise of a "reset." Accra is a city breathing a sigh of guarded relief. The air, heavy with the humidity of the Gulf of Guinea, now carries the distinct, sharp scent of expectation. The infrastructure of the capital remains strained, the traffic gridlock is as daunting as ever, and the informal markets are still the frantic, desperate heart of the economy. But there is a perceptible shift in the mood: the paralyzing anxiety of the previous administration's final days has been replaced by a cautious, almost fragile sense of hope that the fiscal hemorrhaging might finally be staunched.

The people are not asking for more grand, flashy monuments; they are asking for the lights to stay on and for the roads to be repaired. You must shift the focus from "showcase" infrastructure to the mundane, essential reliability that businesses actually need to survive.

The "Youth Bulge" and the Education-Jobs Gap: You now preside over the generation that benefited from your predecessor's "Free SHS" policy, but they are graduating into an economy that has no place for them. You cannot afford to ignore this. If your administration does not rapidly pivot the education system toward technical and vocational training, the "Ghanaian Dream" will sour into a national security crisis. You need to foster a digital-first service economy that can absorb these graduates before their frustration turns into systemic unrest.

Institutional Credibility: Ghana's "gold standard" democracy is not as resilient as the world thinks—it is only as strong as the next electoral cycle. You must use this term to rebuild the independence of the Electoral Commission and the judiciary. The public is watching to see if your return signals a new era of transparency or a return to the patronage politics that historically plagued both your party and your opposition.

Mr. President, you have been given a second chance—a rare political gift. Ghanaians have reached out to you not because they believe in magic, but because they believe in the possibility of competence. Do not waste this time on partisan squabbles. The country needs you to be the "Great Fixer" of the Ghanaian economy, not just the leader of the NDC.
