Your Excellency,

I am writing to you in June 2026, as a citizen watching our once-great nation navigate the darkest chapter of its modern history. Sudan is a land of vast potential—a bridge between the Arab world and Sub-Saharan Africa, a country of nearly 50 million people, and a territory of immense agricultural and mineral wealth. Yet, today, the map of Sudan is defined not by our aspirations, but by the jagged lines of conflict and displacement. We are a nation bleeding, struggling to maintain the very fabric of our society as the drums of war continue to drown out the voices of the people.

Daily life here has become a desperate struggle for survival. For the millions of our brothers and sisters displaced from their homes, the "workplace" is now a refugee camp or a makeshift settlement, where survival is the only trade. Our youth, who

once dreamed of university degrees and professional paths, now find themselves in a struggle for basic sustenance. Education has been stalled for years; the schools are either destroyed, occupied, or simply abandoned, leaving a generation in limbo. We have no formal nursery system; in the midst of this catastrophe, our children are guarded by whatever remains of the extended family—grandparents and mothers who carry the weight of an entire nation on their shoulders.

When a citizen falls ill, the medical system is effectively non-existent for the vast majority. Hospitals have been bombed or looted, and specialized care is a relic of the past. Our elderly, once the respected pillars of our community, are now among the most vulnerable, with no pension to speak of and no state support, relying entirely on the diminishing resources of their kin.

Our entertainment, our culture, and our social gatherings—once the pride of our riverbanks—have been replaced by the silence of fear. We are a people of ancient pride and rich diversity, yet we are being torn apart by a conflict that offers no path forward for the common citizen.

Mr. President, we are weary. The people of Sudan do not want more talk of "sovereignty" while the streets of our cities are turned into battlegrounds. We need an end to the fighting. We need a path back to a civilian-led reality where our farms can be tilled, our children can return to classrooms, and our elderly can find dignity. Give us a Sudan where the gun is silenced, and the voices of our people are heard once more.
