

Letter to the President of Tanzania

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To Her Excellency Samia Suluhu Hassan

President of the United Republic of Tanzania

Your Excellency,

I am writing to you in June 2026 as a citizen of a nation that sits at the very heart of East Africa's promise. Tanzania is a land of giants—from the majesty of Kilimanjaro to the vast expanse of the Serengeti—and a population of nearly 70 million people who are the true architects of our future. We are a country that has long been defined by the spirit of Ujamaa and unity, and today, we stand at a critical juncture where our traditional values meet the rapid acceleration of a globalized economy.

When a citizen falls ill, our healthcare system strives to reach every corner, yet the gap between urban hospitals and rural clinics is a reality we feel daily. For our elderly, the national pension scheme remains a limited safety net, covering mostly those in the formal public sector. For the millions of farmers and traders who have powered this nation for decades, the "pension" is the support of their children—a tradition that is becoming increasingly strained by the rising costs of modern living.

Our entertainment is found in the joy of the Bongo Flava beats that echo through our streets, the communal passion for football, and the gatherings where we celebrate our heritage. We are a people of deep patience and resilience, but we are also a people who are tired of waiting for the fruits of development to reach our kitchen tables.

Madam President, you have shown us that a nation can move with grace and purpose. But we need more. We need an economy that does not just grow in national statistics, but one that empowers the small-scale farmer to thrive and the youth to innovate. Give us a Tanzania where our schools are not just places of attendance but centers of excellence, and where our elderly can retire with the dignity they have earned. Build for us a future where every Tanzanian feels the tangible progress of our great republic.
