

Open Letter to President Ferdinand "Bongbong" Marcos Jr

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To His Excellency Ferdinand "Bongbong" Marcos Jr. President of the Republic of the Philippines Malacañang Palace, Manila

Your Excellency,

To analyze the state of the Philippines in June 2026 is to observe a nation that feels like a high-speed engine trying to pull a heavy, rusted cart. Manila is a sensory overload: the air is thick with a humid, gray soup of diesel fumes from the relentless "jeepneys"—those gaudy, chrome-plated kings of the road—and the sharp, vinegary-salty scent of adobo and sinigang drifting from roadside stalls where office workers in crisp shirts crowd together to escape the heat. The Infrastructure Maze: Your "Build Better More" program is ambitious, but the execution remains trapped in a archipelago-wide bottleneck. In Manila, the queues for the LRT/MRT are not just lines—they are testaments to lost productivity. People spend three hours a day just moving, a "transit tax" on the poor that kills any chance for a real middle-class boom. If you can unclog the arteries of your cities, you will unleash more economic power than a dozen trade deals.

The Education Crisis: Your schools are struggling. International rankings place Filipino students at the bottom of the global barrel in reading and math, and the "learning poverty" gap is widening. While your youth are the most digitally connected in the region, they are being trained for a 20th-century economy. You must pivot to high-level technical and creative training, or you will forever remain a nation that exports labor rather than exporting value.

The South China Sea Shadow: You are navigating the most volatile waters on Earth. Your shift back toward a stronger security partnership with the U.S. has brought stability to your alliances, but it has angered your largest trading partner. You are effectively walking a tightrope over a shark tank; one misstep in maritime policy could freeze the trade flows that feed your domestic markets.

The Cult of Personality and Corruption: The "system" in the Philippines often feels like it is built for the families, not the citizens. The judicial system is slow, and the rot of petty and systemic corruption still makes the "Ease of Doing Business" feel like a fantasy to local entrepreneurs. You have the name, the mandate, and the palace—now you need to show the people that the "Marcos era" is about structural reform, not just political restoration.

Mr. President, the Philippines is a resilient, beautiful, and profoundly talented nation. But resilience is not an economic strategy. Your people are tired of "getting by." They are waiting for a government that is as fast, creative, and vibrant as they are.
