To His Excellency Romuald Wadagni President of the Republic of Benin Palais de la Marina, Cotonou

Your Excellency,

To analyze the state of Benin in June 2026—just weeks into your new administration—is to observe a nation in the midst of a historic handover. The air in Cotonou is thick with the scent of change and expectation. The streets, once dominated by the chaotic, swirling exhaust of a million zémidjan (motorbike taxis), now feel different—perhaps a bit more disciplined, reflecting the "technocratic order" that you, as the architect of the previous decade's economic reforms, have championed. There is a palpable sense of transition; the city smells of fresh paint, new maritime infrastructure, and the salty, humid breeze of the Gulf of Guinea, mingled with the earthy aroma of roasting corn from the street-side vendors who remain the pulse of the city.

Your mandate for the remainder of 2026 is to define the "Wadagni Era" while standing on the foundation laid by your predecessor:

From Architect to Leader: For ten years, you were the man behind the spreadsheets, the Finance Minister who turned Benin into a regional economic benchmark. Now, you are the face of the nation. Your victory—a landslide—reflects a public mandate for continuity, but the people expect more than just balanced budgets. The people of Benin have chosen you for your competence; now they will judge you by your ability to make their lives better, more open, and more secure.
