Your Excellency,

To analyze the state of Guinea in June 2026 is to observe a nation undergoing a forced, high-speed metamorphosis. Conakry today is a city of jarring contradictions: the humid, salty air of the Atlantic is thick with the scent of massive, aggressive construction—new flyovers, modern avenues, and the relentless hum of heavy machinery—all designed to project the image of a "New Guinea." Yet, beneath this facade of rapid industrialization driven by the Simandou project, the streets tell a different story. The urban sprawl of Conakry is suffocating under the weight of its own growth, and outside the capital, the nation remains a mosaic of disjointed regions where the authority of your administration struggles to reach beyond the main thoroughfares.

Your mandate for the remainder of 2026 is to reconcile your vision of a mineral-

powered superpower with the harsh reality of a society that is increasingly exhausted by the lack of democratic "breathing room":

The Simandou Paradox: You have bet the nation's future on the massive iron ore deposits of Simandou. While this project promises to bring unprecedented revenue, it creates a dangerous "single-pillar" economy. If your government does not aggressively diversify into agriculture and local manufacturing, you risk turning Guinea into a glorified mining camp rather than a diversified economy. Wealth must reach the hands of the youth, not just the state treasury, or the "resource curse" will inevitably hollow out your administration's legacy.

The Democratic "Quiet": The aftermath of the May 2026 elections has left the political field barren. By effectively sidelining the opposition and restricting civil discourse, you have created a surface-level calm that masks a deep, simmering frustration. A leader who surrounds himself only with the sounds of his own policies eventually loses the ability to hear the cracks in his foundation. History in West Africa is littered with strongmen who mistook a quiet populace for a satisfied one.

The Infrastructure Gap: You have built beautiful roads in Conakry, but 100 kilometers into the interior, the roads remain treacherous paths that stall commerce and isolate the rural poor from healthcare and markets. True development is not found in the capital's boulevards; it is found in the ability of a farmer in Kankan or Siguiri to move his goods to market without his vehicle falling apart. Your administration must shift its focus from "showcase" infrastructure to the essential reliability that actually supports the informal economy.

The Social Contract: Your administration initially captured the imagination of the youth. But the "liberator" aura is fading. The average Guinean is not asking for more barracks or more iron ore concessions; they are asking for education that leads to jobs, electricity that doesn't flicker, and a social lift that isn't dependent on patronage. If you do not provide these, the youth who cheered for you in 2021 will be the same ones demanding your departure in the coming years.

Mr. President, you have dismantled the old order and built a formidable military-led state. But destruction is easy; creation is the true test of statesmanship. You have the iron ore and the military discipline. Now you need a vision that includes the Guinean

people, not just as laborers in your mines, but as citizens in a pluralistic nation.
