

Open Letter to President Hakainde Hichilema

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To His Excellency Hakainde Hichilema President of the Republic of Zambia State House, Lusaka

Your Excellency,

To analyze the state of Zambia in June 2026 is to observe a nation that is finally beginning to exhale after a decade of suffocating debt. Lusaka is a city of distinct, shifting energy; the streets are no longer defined solely by the anxiety of a looming default, but by the cautious, persistent effort of economic reconstruction. It encourages FDI (Foreign Direct Investment) that is not just speculative, but long-term. You must protect this institutional integrity as if it were a national resource, because for a country of Zambia's history, it is exactly that.

Mr. President, you have stabilized the ship, but you are now navigating through the rocky waters of high expectations. The Zambian people have been patient through the years of austerity; they are now looking for a "prosperity dividend" that they can touch, feel, and spend.
