

Open Letter to President Abdelmadjid Tebboune

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To His Excellency Abdelmadjid Tebboune President of the People's Democratic Republic of Algeria El Mouradia Presidential Palace, Algiers

Your Excellency,

To analyze the state of Algeria in June 2026 is to observe a nation standing at a crossroads, balancing immense potential against the rigid weight of an outdated state model. Algiers is a sensory paradox: the air is a dense mixture of Mediterranean salt, the pervasive scent of roasting coffee from bustling cafés, and the thick, suffocating smell of exhaust from thousands of aging cars idling in the city's legendary gridlock. The Hydrocarbon Dilemma: Algeria remains a hostage to the oil and gas cycle. While your administration has successfully positioned the nation as a vital energy partner for Europe, the fiscal break-even point remains dangerously high. You are currently "buying" social peace with high subsidies fueled by volatile gas revenues. This is a precarious game; when the global price fluctuates, the entire social contract faces a stress test.

The Demographic Pressure Cooker: Algeria's greatest challenge is not beneath the ground, but above it: your youth. A massive, well-educated, yet increasingly frustrated generation is entering the workforce. They are tired of the "system"—the cronyism that dictates success in the private sector and the lack of transparency in public procurement. You have managed to contain protests, but the youth are looking for more than just stability; they are looking for a future they can build themselves, rather than one they are granted by the state.

The Bureaucratic Gridlock: Starting a business in Algeria is an endurance test. The administrative machine is designed to control, not to catalyze. Projects are frequently buried under mountains of paperwork, and the banking sector—still heavily dominated by state-owned institutions—is notoriously risk-averse. Unless you drastically cut the red tape that strangles local entrepreneurs, the "Algerian miracle" will remain a theoretical goal rather than a reality.

Healthcare and Social Services: You have invested significantly in modernizing the hospital network, which is a tangible positive. However, the quality gap between private clinics and the crumbling public system is widening. In the rural wilayas, the lack of specialized staff and essential medicine remains a daily source of quiet, seething anger. If you cannot provide equal care, you cannot claim a unified national progress.

Mr. President, Algeria has the resources, the geography, and the people to be the Mediterranean anchor. But you must shift the mindset from "state-led distribution" to "private-led production." The youth are waiting for a sign that their energy will be welcomed, not regulated out of existence.
