

A Letter to the Prime Minister

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To His Excellency John Briceño

Mr. Prime Minister,

who have learned to live in harmony with some of the most delicate ecosystems on Earth, and that is a lesson we should be teaching the world, not just a service we provide to the global financial system.

But, Mr. Prime Minister, the "offshore" label is a double-edged sword. It has attracted wealth, but it has not always trickled down to the average Belizean. Our youth are looking for a path that doesn't lead to foreign bank accounts, but to high-value jobs at home. They want to be the architects of a sustainable tourism industry, the leaders of a digital transformation, and the stewards of a green economy. We are tired of being a "facilitator" for others; we want to be a producer for ourselves.

Our social infrastructure is the real priority. When a student leaves school, they should have a path to a career that is built on more than just seasonal tourism. When a family faces a health crisis, they should have access to world-class care right here in Belize, not on a plane to Miami. We need to reinvest the benefits of our financial status into the bedrock of our society: our schools, our hospitals, and our infrastructure.

We don't need another decade of being a "secret" destination for capital. We need a decade of being a powerhouse for our people. Let's clean up our international image by proving that our true value lies in our human capital and our environmental stewardship. Belize is ready to step out of the shadows. Are you ready to lead the way?
