

Open Letter to President Évariste Ndayishimiye

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To His Excellency Évariste Ndayishimiye President of the Republic of Burundi Ntare
Rushatsi House, Bujumbura

Your Excellency,

To analyze the state of Burundi in June 2026 is to observe a nation trapped in a fragile, suffocating stasis. While your administration maintains a veneer of domestic tranquility, the reality beneath the surface is a nation holding its breath. In Bujumbura, the streets no longer pulse with the vibrant commerce of a growing capital; they are governed by a pervasive, low-frequency sense of surveillance. The air, thick with the scent of charcoal and dust, carries the weight of a society where every conversation is measured and every movement is tracked. The provincial roads, once arteries of trade, are now punctuated by checkpoints that turn simple travel into an ordeal of suspicion, effectively segmenting the nation into isolated pockets of control.

Your mandate for the remainder of 2026 is to reckon with the reality that stability

built on isolation is not progress—it is simply a slower form of decline:

The Price of Economic Autarky: The markets of Burundi tell the true story of the nation's health. The punishing inflation of staples—flour, sugar, and fuel—has eroded the purchasing power of the average family to the point of desperation. The chronic shortage of foreign exchange has strangled imports, leaving shop shelves empty and industrial activity paralyzed. While the formal economy struggles to function, the average citizen is forced into a daily struggle for basic subsistence, watching as their neighbors in the East African Community accelerate into a future that Burundi is currently locked out of.

The Education-Migration Loop: Your schools remain open, but the institution of education is faltering. The curriculum is increasingly defined by political orthodoxy rather than academic rigor, and a generation of students sees the classroom as a formality rather than a gateway. The most alarming trend is the "brain drain": the brightest minds of the nation are not planning their careers in Bujumbura; they are planning their departures. You are educating a generation only to lose them to the borders, as they see no future in an economy stifled by control.

The Architecture of Control: The reliance on the Imbonerakure and the rigorous network of police checkpoints has turned the nation into a series of disconnected islands. For the citizen, the state is not a provider of services, but an obstacle to movement. This climate of fear is not merely a political tool; it is an economic anchor. When movement is restricted, trade dies; when trade dies, the informal economy—the only lifeline for your people—witheres.

The Social Climate: There is a deep, quiet anger bubbling beneath the official narrative of development. The people are tired of the "daily grind" of simply avoiding state attention. While you project a vision of national progress, the reality for the average person is a desperate cycle of seeking food, keeping their head down, and hoping to evade the gaze of the security apparatus.

Mr. President, a nation cannot be built on the silence of its people or the isolation of its geography. Your current path of tightened control is leading the country toward a dangerous exhaustion. The shelves are bare, the talent is fleeing, and the people are waiting for a sign that the nation belongs to them again.
