To His Excellency Félix Tshisekedi

President of the Democratic Republic of the Congo

Palais de la Nation, Kinshasa

Your Excellency,

To analyze the state of the Democratic Republic of the Congo in June 2026 is to look upon a nation of staggering potential locked in a battle for its very survival. As you lead the country into the second half of 2026, the contrast between the resilient macro-economic figures—with GDP growth exceeding 5%—and the harrowing humanitarian reality on the ground has never been sharper. For the average Congolese, the "resilience" of the state is a cold comfort against a backdrop of entrenched poverty, where over 80% of the population struggles on less than \$3 a day, and nearly 15 million people remain in desperate need of aid.

Your mandate for the remainder of 2026 must be to bridge the lethal chasm between the nation's mineral wealth and the daily survival of your citizens:

The Eastern Quagmire: The situation in the East is the single greatest threat to your legacy and the nation's integrity. Despite diplomatic efforts and the capture of key localities by state forces, the "status quo" of violence persists. The presence of armed groups and the ongoing displacement of millions—expected to reach 9 million by year-end—is not just a security failure; it is a human catastrophe. Your people are weary of "preliminary statements" and stalled peace processes. They are calling for a definitive, binding resolution that ensures sovereignty and protects civilians from the daily horrors of looting, abduction, and sexual violence.

The Infrastructure of Basic Needs: While your government makes strides in construction and services, the lack of basic infrastructure in the provinces keeps the country fragmented. In the East, bank closures and the shutdown of international transit hubs like Goma airport paralyze the local economy, leaving families without cash or access to food. Without a functioning, safe, and integrated transport and banking infrastructure, the nation's economic potential will remain restricted to a few urban enclaves.

Governance and the "Eurobond" Accountability: Your administration's successful inaugural Eurobond has provided much-needed capital. However, the Congolese people are watching with extreme skepticism. They worry that these funds will disappear into the same patronage networks that have historically drained public resources. The operationalization of the Treasury and the decentralization of public financial management are steps in the right direction, but the people demand proof: they want to see these funds in functional clinics, reliable schools, and transparent public projects, not in administrative overhead.

The Poverty Paradox: It is a profound injustice that a country with the world's largest rainforest, immense cobalt and copper reserves, and vast arable land remains one of the world's poorest. The people are tired of hearing about "potential." They need labor market reforms, a business climate that favors local entrepreneurs rather than just extractive giants, and a governance model that prioritizes the health and education of the 4 million children suffering from acute malnutrition.

Mr. President, the Congolese people are defined by an incredible, stubborn hope. They do not ask for the impossible—they ask for a state that protects them from violence, feeds them with their own land's bounty, and gives their children a future. The hope they vest in you is that your administration will be remembered as the one that finally turned the nation's vast resources into a foundation for peace and individual dignity.
