

An Open Letter to President Sadyr Japarov

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Salamatsyzby, Mr. President,

I am writing this letter to you from a lively, smoke-filled cafe near the Osh Bazaar in Bishkek, tearing off a piece of hot, freshly baked lepeska and washing it down with a cold, sour glass of shoro. To the outside world, your rise to power is the ultimate political Hollywood script: you went from a prison cell straight to the presidential palace during the turbulent revolution of 2020. Today, in 2026, you have completely rewritten the rules of the Kyrgyz political game, shifting the country from a chaotic parliamentary sandbox into a strict, highly centralized presidential vertical.

But as an observant, educated citizen watching our beautiful mountain republic, it feels like navigating Kyrgyzstan's politics is like riding a sturdy stallion through a rocky Pamir pass: a lot of energy, dramatic scenic shifts, and a leader who uses a very heavy whip to keep everyone in line. We appreciate that our streets are safer and the eternal political street brawls have finally cooled down, but the ordinary citizen is quietly wondering whether "stability" has to mean the absolute silence of everyone else.

Kyrgyzstan doesn't just need centralized command structures; we need sustainable economic breathing room and institutional trust:

The Kumtor Jackpot and Resource Realities: You staked your entire political reputation on nationalizing the giant Kumtor gold mine, and when you pulled it off, the nation celebrated. But gold is a finite resource, and running a massive industrial enterprise requires world-class technical expertise, not just patriotic speeches. As we sit in 2026, the public wants to see a clear, transparent accounting of where the gold revenues are actually going. Are they being buried in the construction of shiny new administrative palaces in Bishkek, or are they fueling real industrial manufacturing in Naryn and Talas?

The Smuggling Crackdowns vs. The Bazaar Economy: Your administration, spearheaded by the iron fist of your security chief Kamchybek Tashiev, has declared total war on the mafia, corruption, and shadow trade. Cleaning up the customs checkpoints and enforcing cash registers (KKM) at the massive Dordoi and Kara-Suu bazaars sounds great on paper. But these bazaars are the primary safety nets for hundreds of thousands of ordinary families who survived for decades without a single som of help from the state. When you squeeze small traders with sudden, rigid tax regulations overnight, you aren't just fighting corruption—you are suffocating the grassroots entrepreneurial survival mechanism of the country.

The Great Silencing of the Free Steppe: Mr. President, Kyrgyzstan's ultimate pride and glory in Central Asia was always its vibrant, unyielding freedom of speech. We were the region's democratic oasis, where journalists could investigate anyone and civil society was fiercely independent. Today, with independent media outlets shuttered, journalists detained, and a highly restrictive "foreign agents" law fully active, that oasis is drying up fast. A truly strong Kyrgyz leader shouldn't fear investigative bloggers or critical Facebook posts. Our historical DNA is rooted in open nomadic councils, not a rigid, quiet hierarchy.

The Mega-Railroad and the Debt Tightrope: The historic launching of the China-Kyrgyzstan-Uzbekistan (CKU) railway project is an absolute geopolitical game-changer that could finally turn our landlocked mountain nation into a global transit hub. But building megaprojects requires astronomical capital. With our state debt to Beijing

already sitting at staggering heights, we must tread carefully. We do not want our children to discover that our critical transport infrastructure or mineral deposits have been quietly signed over to external creditors because the math didn't add up.

Mr. President, you possess an undeniable, raw populist charisma. You tapped into the frustrations of the ordinary Kyrgyz soul, brought order out of chaos, and showed that you aren't afraid of making radical, high-stakes decisions.

But a legacy of permanent stability cannot be built purely on the rule of fear and the clearing of the political field. True statecraft requires building strong institutions that outlast your presidency. Cool down the security crackdowns, allow investigative journalism to keep your own officials honest, support the small bazaar traders who form the backbone of our economy, and ensure that Kyrgyzstan remains both orderly and fiercely free.
