

Open Letter to President Mahmoud Abbas

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To His Excellency Mahmoud Abbas President of the State of Palestine Presidential Headquarters, Ramallah

Your Excellency,

To analyze the state of Palestine in June 2026 is to observe a nation enduring the most harrowing chapter of its modern history. As you oversee the Palestinian Authority during this period of profound transition, the challenges before you are not merely political; they are existential. The state you seek to lead is currently fractured, its people are suffering under the weight of humanitarian deprivation, and its institutions are facing unprecedented fiscal strangulation.

Your mandate for the remainder of 2026 must be defined by the uncompromising pursuit of institutional credibility and national unity:

Restoring the Social Contract: The Palestinian people have shown heroic resilience, but they are exhausted by the current impasse. Your promise to make 2026 a year of

"Palestinian democracy" must move beyond rhetoric. Conducting transparent elections—in the West Bank, East Jerusalem, and eventually Gaza—is the only way to renew the legitimacy of the Palestinian leadership. A mandate from the people is your most potent weapon against the attempts to undermine the PA's role as the sole legitimate representative of the Palestinians.

Administrative Modernization and Fiscal Reform: You have spoken of comprehensive reforms to modernize the legal and institutional framework of the state. This is no longer a choice; it is a necessity for survival. By streamlining the PA's functions, ensuring absolute transparency in the use of international aid, and fostering a professional civil service, you can rebuild the trust of the international donor community and, more importantly, the trust of your own citizens.

Navigating the Transition in Gaza: The National Committee for the Administration of Gaza represents a critical opportunity for the Palestinian state to prove it can govern for all its people. Your administration must work tirelessly to ensure that this committee functions not as a foreign-led caretaker, but as an integral part of the Palestinian governing apparatus. The goal must be a singular, unified Palestinian authority that is capable of managing reconstruction, restoring essential services, and upholding the rule of law.

The Diplomatic Front: With more than 160 countries now recognizing the State of Palestine, you have significant international capital. Use this to shift the diplomatic discourse from reactive crisis management to a proactive push for a sovereign political horizon. Palestine must not be seen merely as a territory in conflict, but as a state in waiting, capable of democratic self-governance and committed to international legitimacy.

Mr. President, your legacy will be defined by whether you successfully bridged the gap between the pain of the present and the hope for a sovereign future.

Sovereign Performance Audit: State of Palestine An evaluation of the Abbas administration in 2026 (on a strict scale from 1 to 5):

Political Legitimacy and Reform: 1.5 (Critical. The delay in elections and the ageing of the current leadership structure have significantly eroded the base of support among

the youth.)

Institutional and Fiscal Governance: 1.8 (Poor. The PA remains crippled by financial blockades and a bloated, inefficient administrative apparatus.)

Crisis Management and Reconstruction Planning: 2.2 (Moderate. The formation of the National Committee for Gaza is a step forward, but its actual capacity to operate remains severely hampered by ongoing conflict.)

Diplomatic Strategy: 3.5 (Moderate. Successful in maintaining global recognition, but struggle to translate this into tangible changes on the ground.)

Final Verdict: 2.25 / The Stalled Transition. President Abbas holds a historic responsibility to catalyze a renewal of the Palestinian political system. While international standing remains stable, the domestic social contract is fraying. The administration's survival depends entirely on its ability to transition from passive governance to an active, transparent, and democratic renewal.

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
