

An Open Letter to President Shavkat Mirziyoyev

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Assalomu Alaykum, Muhtaram Prezident,

Break up the luxury monopolies, guarantee the absolute independence of the courts, fix the rural energy crisis, and allow the incredible, hardworking people of Uzbekistan to build their wealth through fair competition, not just administrative favors.
