

An Open Letter to Head of Government Xavier Espot Zamora The Silent Swiss-Style Architect of Pyrenean Modernization

Mr. Espot, your calm, judicial background has served you well in managing Andorra's complex institutions. You have brought transparency, international compliance, and a forward-thinking vision to a country that historically feared change.

But the mandate of 2026 demands that you look down from the macro-economic charts and address the immediate realities of the valleys. If Andorrans can no longer afford to live in Andorra, the economic growth you champion will ring hollow. True modernization must protect the people who form the backbone of the Principality. Your legacy will not be judged by how well Andorra integrates into Europe, but by how well it preserves the livelihood and dignity of its own citizens.
