

An Open Letter to President Kassym-Jomart Tokayev

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Asalamu Alaykum, Mr. President,

I am writing this letter to you while sitting in a trendy, minimalist coffee shop in Almaty, casually splitting a plate of boursaks and a piece of high-end horsemeat steak with a group of local IT developers. However, the deeply rooted economic monopolies are proving remarkably stubborn. Breaking up the old networks of the "Family" is like trying to untangle a massive plate of beshbarmak—everything is sticky and deeply connected. The local business community is still waiting for a truly level playing field where a brilliant startup can thrive without a well-connected Aka (big brother) taking a 50% cut of the profits. We need real corporate demonopolization, not just high-profile trials.

The Hyper-Digital Ecosystem vs. Crumbling Infrastructure: Our digital infrastructure is elite—we can register a vehicle or change our tax status in three clicks on a government mobile app. But you cannot heat a house with a smartphone app. While we launch the "Digital Qazaqstan" strategy and talk about heavy AI integration, our communal infrastructure is quietly weeping. The heating system collapses in cities like Ekibastuz, our regional roads are still an extreme sport, and water deficits are threatening our southern agricultural lands. Let's make sure our basic physical plumbing is as reliable as our digital code.

The Price of Bread and the Stagnant Middle Class: Living in Astana or Almaty has become an expensive luxury. Inflation has turned a casual trip to the Magnum supermarket into a high-stakes financial negotiation. While macro-statistics proudly showcase our surging GDP and oil revenues, the actual purchasing power of a school teacher in Shymkent or a factory worker in Karaganda is barely keeping pace with inflation. Our economy remains heavily dependent on resource extraction. We need to rapidly diversify into real production, manufacturing, and tourism, ensuring that the wealth from our oil and minerals directly stabilizes the daily cost of living for the middle class.

The Golden Multi-Vector Tightrope: Your diplomatic team deserves immense credit. Keeping Kazakhstan sovereign, open, and friendly with Moscow, Beijing, Washington, and Brussels simultaneously in 2026 is an absolute masterclass in geopolitical ballet. But this multi-vector strategy must also be applied internally. Our society is rapidly changing—the youth are increasingly national-conscious, fluent in Kazakh, and eager for authentic democratic representation. The newly created Kurultai (Congress) and constitutional reforms are a positive step, but they must not become a decorative consultative ornament. Give the youth real political space, foster genuine parliamentary pluralism, and allow constructive civil society to breathe.

Mr. President, you brought calm and institutional predictability to Kazakhstan during some of its darkest and most chaotic moments. You have proven that you possess the sophisticated intellect and the strategic patience to guide this massive nation through a global storm.

But a truly "Fair Kazakhstan" cannot be built on digital optics alone. It requires the courage to completely dismantle the remaining oligarchic structures, invest heavily in the physical revitalization of our regions, and bridge the massive wealth gap between our glittering financial hubs and the hardworking provinces. Keep pushing the digital envelope, but never forget the real, non-digital needs of the people on the ground.
